Following the Standing Committee meeting, an informational sharing meeting was held between staff from Lycoming and Clinton County Children and Youth Services.

Commissioner Snyder Moved and Commissioner Metzger Seconded a Motion to:

"Approve the minutes from the April 20, 2022 Joinder Board meeting as presented by staff."

The Motion passed unanimously.

BUDGET UPDATES

HealthChoices – Calendar Year 2022 Budget Approval – Mr. Wagner noted that the HealthChoices program operates on a calendar year and that due to an average 2 month delay in receiving funding from the State and payments from insurance carriers, it has taken fiscal staff until now to finalize the budget for calendar year 2021 and prepare the budget for approval for calendar year 2022. He noted that the budget sheet distributed to the Board shows that revenues estimated for 2021 were \$57,605,027 and the actual amount received was \$60,189,941. Expenses for 2021 were budgeted at \$55,000,564 and the final expenses were \$59,001,843. For calendar year 2022, they are estimating the receipt of \$59,420,290 in revenue and expenses to be in the range of \$58,745,379. He noted that the HealthChoices program is allowed to keep a portion of any remaining funds which they can place in a risk and contingency fund in the event it would be needed to cover unexpected expenses. Remaining funds can also be used for reinvestment purposes and he noted that there is a committee that meets to determine the best way to distribute

these funds. Commissioner Snyder requested that a reinvestment update report be provided to the Board at future meetings. Commissioner Metzger Moved and Commissioner Mussare Seconded a Motion to:

"Approve the calendar year 2022 HealthChoices budget with estimates of \$59,420,290 in revenue and \$58,754,379 in expenses as presented by staff."

The Motion passed unanimously.

<u>HealthChoices: Calendar Year 2022</u> – Mr. Wagner noted that the budget report for **HealthChoices** through March reflects 25% of the year. He added that both revenue and expenses are running at 25%.


